

MAJOR DESCRIPTION

Sociology is the study of human behavior, group processes, social institutions and societies. Sociologists are often interested in why people act in particular ways, how they function within social groups and how societies change over time. The subject matter of sociology is extremely wide-ranging, from the interaction between two people to economic and political relations among nations.

Sociology graduates can also use these research skills in the private sector as a data analyst conducting research for major corporations. Other careers include social work, program director, consultant, counselor, caseworker, child welfare officer, personnel specialist, public administrator, community organizer, labor relations representative, public relations director, or, like Martin Luther King, inspiring reformer.
