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# **Budget** Overview

### Plan 2023: Ambitious Goals for Growth, Innovation and Engagement

Cameron University enters the 2020 - 2021 academic year having completed the second of five years toward meeting strategic planning goals established in *Plan 2023: Ambitious Goals for Growth, Innovation and Engagement.* The key goals of this plan will be used to assign budget allocations and to make budget decisions. The actions and initiatives to advance those goals for 2020 - 2021 are as follows:



## • Goal One – Transform student lives

Student Academic Support

- Implement EAB *Navigate* as a student retention software tool to replace the internally developed, end-of-life Early Alert System
- Implement an electronic resource loan or check-out program for students attending conferences or meetings off campus

### Student Life Enhancement

 Study and possibly implement a telecounseling opportunity through the Student Wellness Center



- Goal Two Provide quality educational opportunities for the diverse community of Cameron University learners
  - Offer concurrent instruction opportunities in area high schools in Lawton and Cache
  - Allocate and award at least \$7.2 million in student scholarships and tuition waivers from E&G, Auxiliary and CU Foundation funds in addition to \$1.7 million from CARES Act funds
  - Create policy and implement student applications and awards using Cameron Aggie Response (CARE) funding through the Cameron University Foundation
  - Continue discussions with OU Engineering regarding a partnership or collaboration opportunity in the Lawton-Fort Sill community to build upon the demonstrated success of the Associate-level program



- Goal Three Recruit, develop and retain highly qualified faculty and staff committed to advancing the mission of the university
  - Initiate faculty applications for the rank of Senior Instructor in support of Faculty Senate recommended changes
  - Evaluate and possibly restructure duties and staffing within campus housing
  - Create and implement a leadership program for entry level staff members who show potential as candidates for future campus leadership positions
  - Grow the "Legacy of Excellence" Endowed Faculty Position Program



- Goal Four Strengthen the economic, cultural and civic life of the Cameron University service area in Southwest Oklahoma and beyond
  - Offer speakers and activities for Academic Festival XI during the 2020 2021 academic year
  - Host Oklahoma Research Day in Spring 2021 and Spring 2022
  - Schedule and execute an alternative Commencement for the Class of 2020
  - Implement high school engagement programs with public schools in Cache, Duncan, and Elgin



# • Goal Five – Renovate and refresh existing facilities and technologies to meet the needs of current and future students

  - Agriculture Complex remodel and information technology access
  - $\circ$  CU Duncan library and information center
  - Haggar Hall remodel phase two
  - Veterans Grove phase two
  - Develop and possibly implement a plan for an exterior campus space to recognize the gifts of the McMahon Foundation to Cameron University



- Construction and Renovation Projects
  - Exterior wireless access point installation at the Library and Howell Hall parking lots
  - o Jesse Davenport Unity Garden expansion and parking lot extension
  - Haggar Hall remodel of music student practice rooms
  - Library renovation and atrium addition
  - Sciences Complex construction of instructional greenhouses Phase One
  - Shepler Center elevator replacement and installation
  - University Theatre replace stage lift
  - Aggie Gym resurface and repaint floor and install permanently mounted basketball goals
  - Cameron Stadium replace artificial surface
  - McCord Field construct outdoor baseball hitting cages
  - McMahon Field construct outdoor softball hitting cages
  - Streich-Henry Family Tennis Complex resurface the McMahon Foundation Tennis Courts

Cameron University provides outstanding student-centered learning opportunities with highly qualified faculty and staff at an exceptional value



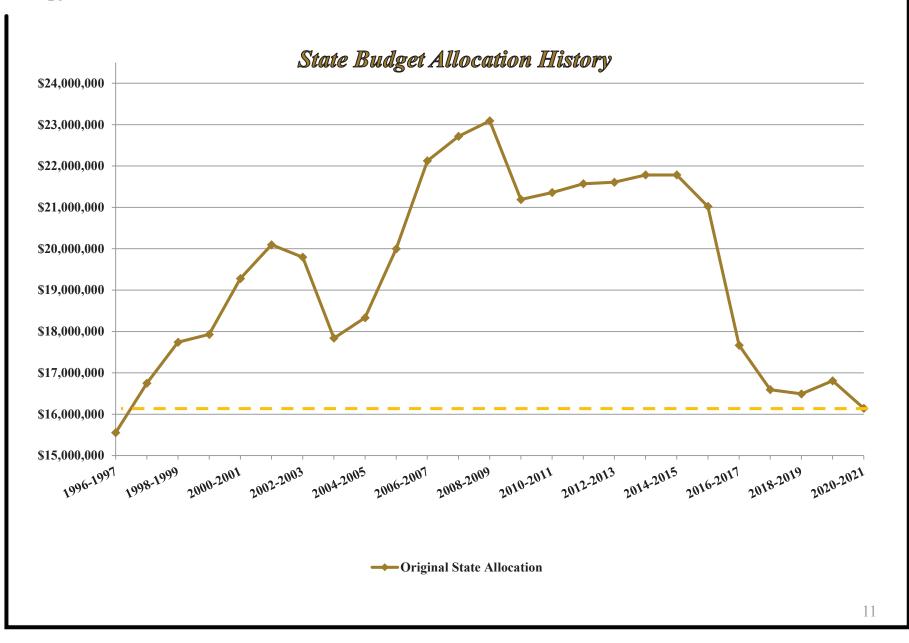
